## HIV IN LOUISIANA, BY THE NUMBERS<sup>1</sup>



**19,492:** the number of Louisianans living with diagnosed HIV/AIDS in 2015.



**3rd in the nation:** for HIV diagnosis rates in 2016.



**4th in the nation:** for HIV related death rates in 2015.



**59.1%** of individuals diagnosed in 2016 were between age 13 and 34.



## Louisiana DEPENDS ON RYAN WHITE:<sup>2</sup>

- An estimated **12,608 Louisianans** received services through Ryan White in 2015.
- **64.8%** were living at or below the poverty line.
- Since Ryan White is legally required to be the "payer of last resort," these people did not have other access to medical or support services.

## Federal Ryan White Funding in LA<sup>3</sup>

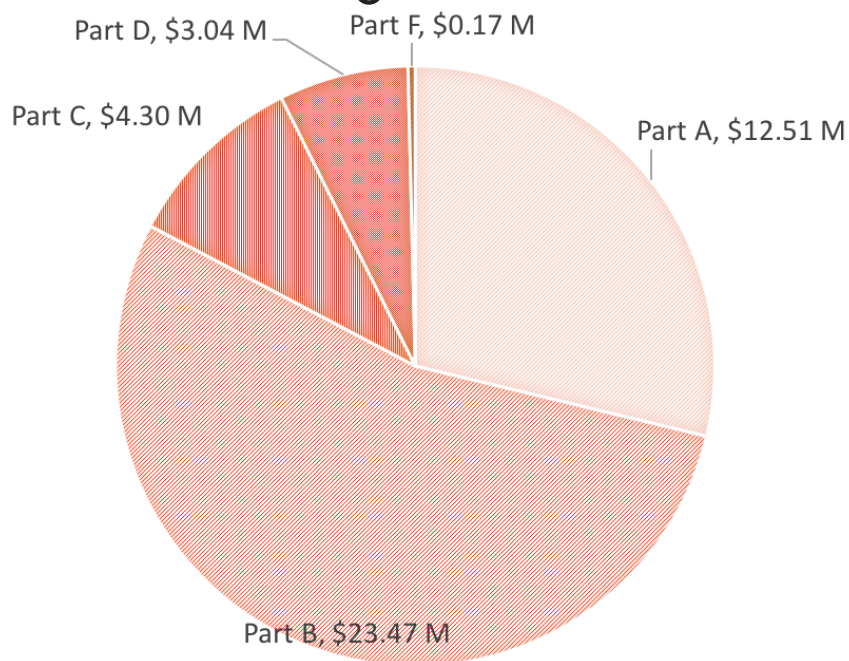
Part A: \$12.51M

## Louisiana received **\$43.5 million** in federal Ryan White funds in 2017:<sup>4</sup>

- **\$16.8 million** went to ADAP.
- **\$12.5 million** went to Baton Rouge and New Orleans, the state's only cities eligible for Part A funding for urban areas. As a result, Part B funding (for states) is particularly important in Louisiana.

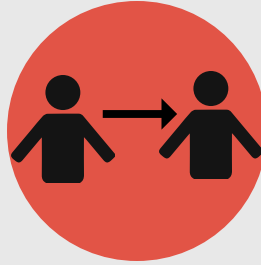
Ryan White services keep HIV-positive individuals in treatment and care



With treatment, people with HIV can live active, healthy lives.



People whose virus is suppressed for 6 months cannot transmit HIV through sex.



But, if disconnected from care, resistance to medications can develop making it easier to transmit HIV. Moreover, without treatment HIV is deadly.<sup>5</sup>

## HIV CARE CONTINUUM:

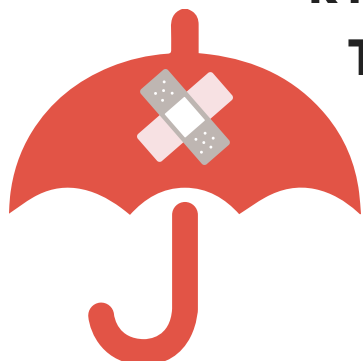
THE SERIES OF STEPS A PERSON WITH HIV TAKES FROM INITIAL DIAGNOSIS THROUGH THEIR SUCCESSFUL TREATMENT WITH HIV MEDICATION



While only **58%** of people nationwide have a viral load that is effectively suppressed as of 2014,<sup>6</sup> **84.9%** of HIV-positive clients who had received at least one Ryan White funded medical care visit have achieved viral suppression.<sup>7</sup>



## RYAN WHITE PROVIDES COVERAGE FOR THOSE WITHOUT OTHER OPTIONS IN LOUISIANA



**3,009** Ryan White program clients living with HIV in Louisiana had no insurance coverage other than Ryan White in 2015.<sup>8</sup>

No other program provides the same set of gap-filling services or care as Ryan White. Even after health reform, **Ryan White remains crucial for Louisiana.**
